# Draft Domestic and Sexual Abuse Strategy 2023-2030

**Consultation Document** 

7 February 2023





### Introduction

- 1. This consultation seeks views on a new draft Domestic and Sexual Abuse Strategy to cover the seven-year period from 2023 until 2030. It is being undertaken jointly by the Department of Health and the Department of Justice and will replace the current <u>Stopping Domestic and Sexual Violence and Abuse</u> <u>Strategy</u> which is now in its final year.
- 2. The strategy recognises that anyone can be a victim of domestic and sexual abuse regardless of age, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, ethnicity, religion or any form of disability. However, we do acknowledge that the majority of victims are female and this also has informed our approach.
- 3. We are inviting you to share your views on its content and format to ensure we are taking the right approach to tackling domestic and sexual abuse. We would be particularly keen to hear from:
  - those with lived experience of domestic or sexual abuse;
  - those from different groups and communities including victims from LGBTQIA+ and minority ethnic communities and those with a disability;
  - organisations that provide support to victims including children;
  - frontline professionals, such as those working in health and social care, education, housing and the criminal justice system;
  - academics and researchers; and
  - the general public.

### Overview of draft strategy

- 4. The vision of the draft strategy is that **domestic and sexual abuse is** unacceptable within our homes and across all of society so that everyone can live without fear.
- 5. Our overall strategic aim is to work together as partners, agencies and communities to make real, sustainable progress in tackling domestic and sexual abuse by addressing the root causes; ensuring those affected get the right support; and holding individuals who are abusive to account.
- 6. To achieve this aim, the strategy is designed around **four pillars**:
  - **Partnership:** driving change together through joint commitment, leadership and partnership working.
  - **Prevention:** preventing domestic and sexual abuse from happening by challenging the attitudes and behaviours that foster it and intervening early where possible to prevent it.
  - **Support:** ensuring that all victims of domestic and sexual abuse including children can access services supporting them to recover and rebuild their lives.

- **Justice:** holding individuals who are abusive to account and ensuring justice responses are effective.
- 7. The following eight outcomes have been identified across the four pillars:



8. Key priority areas of work to deliver these outcomes are set out within the draft strategy and will be expanded on in further detail in a series of action plans that will be developed annually. The first action plan will be published alongside the final strategy.

### Strategy development process

9. We have sought to consult and engage as broadly as possible. This began in January 2022 when the Departments launched a ten week Call for Views with extensive input and direction from a wide range of stakeholders. A <u>Summary Report</u> of the feedback and responses received was published on 7 July 2022. This laid the foundations for the strategy development process as summarised below:

### Why are you processing my personal information?

Comments are being sought from interested parties as part of a Consultation on a new Domestic and Sexual Abuse Strategy. Personal data is not being sought as part of the Call for Views engagement but names, addresses and/or e-mail addresses may be provided as part of responses received. Consultation is a requisite part of the development of public policy and strategy.

Consent is not being relied on for processing the data supplied by consultees. Responses are being sought as part of the policy development process.

### Lawful Basis for processing

The lawful basis relied upon by DoJ and DoH is Article 6(1)(e) UKGDPR, as we are carrying out this Consultation in the public interest and on the basis of our public task.

While we do not intend to process identifiable information or special category information, we have taken into consideration how some questions may inadvertently lead to identification of an individual and processing of special category personal data (if such data is inadvertently shared by respondents as part of their response). We consider the lawful basis for processing this data to be covered under Article 9(2)(g) UKGDPR and meeting the condition for processing contained at Schedule 1 Part 2 Paragraph 7 of the Data Protection Act 2018 (Administration of Justice).

### The intention is to anonymise all responses once they are received and processed by the Department of Justice, prior to them being shared with the Department of Health.

What categories of personal data are you processing?

While personal data is not being sought as part of responses to the Consultation, those responding may include names, addresses and/or e-mail addresses. If a respondent provides any of these identifiers and any further information as part of their responses, this could lead to the processing of special category data, e.g. if the respondent discloses health data and their name has been provided at the outset. However, it is the intention that DoJ will ensure that responses are anonymised to prevent further processing of special category data inadvertently disclosed, and before responses are further processed or shared.

### Where do you get my personal data from?

The personal data will originate from the person responding to the Consultation.

### Do you share my personal data with anyone else?

The Department of Justice will be processing the responses when they are received and will provide anonymised responses to the Department of Health, so that these may be considered in the context of the strategy being taken forward.

### How long do you keep my personal data?
